## INFORMATION ABOUT THE CAMBIO DE COLORES CONFERENCE

*"Cambio de Colores* (Change of Colors)" is an annual conference that, since 2002, focuses on issues related to the integration of Latino and other immigrants to Missouri and other new destination states in the American Heartland. The conference goal is to provide knowledge towards a smooth and lasting integration of the new population, through the following specific objectives:

- To assess the changes brought about by the presence of new Latino urban and rural settlers in Missouri and other new destination states of the Midwest, the South and elsewhere.
- To inform about the multiple contributions—economic, social, and cultural—that these newcomers are bringing to many communities in Missouri and in these regions.
- To understand the opportunities this demographic change is bringing to the people, communities, businesses, and educational institutions.
- To provide a forum to discuss the challenges that growth and change generate for institutions and people—both new and long-term residents of these new immigrant destinations.
- To share relevant scholarship and best practices, as well as identify knowledge and service needs that should be addressed.

The three-day conference convenes academic research and extension specialists, public and private service providers, grassroots organizations, state and local government institutions, politicians, corporations, and newcomers themselves. The conference is sponsored by the University of Missouri, in cooperation with community and state partners. It is mostly funded by participants (who have numbered between 100 and 300 in past conferences) and sponsors.

The 2013 conference theme is "Positive Steps toward a Pluralist Society," and it reflects the urgent need to incorporate newcomers into every segment of society. The conference is a collaborative effort with the twelve-state North Central Extension and Research Activity "Latinos and Immigrants in Midwestern Communities" (NCERA 216), an initiative that brings together a large number of universities and institutions addressing similar changes in the Midwest.

The first three conferences were created and led by the Hispanic and Latin American Faculty & Staff Association of the University of Missouri-Columbia (HLAFSA). The Cambio Center led the organization of the subsequent events.

Seventh: Columbia in 2008 - "Uniting Cultures – Uniendo Culturas" Eighth: St. Louis in 2009 - "Latinos in the Heartland" Ninth: Columbia in 2010 - "Latinos and Immigrants in Midwestern Communities" Tenth: Kansas City in 2011 – "Migration and Shifting Human Landscapes" Eleventh: Columbia in 2012 – "At the Crossroads: ¿Incorporation or Marginalization?

The twelfth conference will take place at the University of Missouri - St. Louis on June 12-14, 2013. Preparations are already under way, supported by a Planning Committee that draws on leadership from across the nation. This year's conference is organized along themes that include:

- Change and Integration,
- Civil Rights and Political Participation,
- Education,
- Health,, and
- Entrepreneurship and Economic Development

The main institutional support for the conference comes from the **Cambio Center for Research and Outreach on Latinos and Changing Communities**, established by the University of Missouri - Columbia in the fall of 2004.
