A Diego Abente

In this role, he spearheaded a twofold annual growth in lending, leading to record performance of loans to immigrant entrepreneurs in our region. This tremendous turn-around culminated with the IISTL receiving the 2015 St. Louis Arcus award.

Prior to moving to St. Louis in 2012, Diego served as Paraguay's representative at the Inter-American Development Bank in Washington DC. Earlier in his career, Diego managed the operations for a non-profit working to eradicate malaria in Equatorial Guinea, Africa as well as served as General Counsel in Paraguay's Department of Treasury. Diego received his undergraduate degree in law from the Catholic University of Paraguay, and received an MS in Governance and Development Management from the University of Birmingham in the UK.

Her interdisciplinary research examines the experiences of marginalized groups in educational settings, the role of organizational policy and practice in the promotion or inhibition of egalitarian academic and occupational outcomes, and spirituality in the workplace and other learning environments. Dr. Davis is the elected Chair of the American Educational Research Association's (AERA's) Spirituality and Education Special Interest Group (SIG) and has served within the leadership of AERA's Qualitative Research SIG. She has published over 60 refereed journal articles, book chapters, volumes, academic commentaries, and reviews. Dr. Davis is Series Editor of the Information Age Publishing book series, Contemporary Perspectives on Spirituality in Education, where she coordinates and leads guest editors and authors from around the globe in the development of scholarly volumes. Zandra de Araujo is an assistant professor of Mathematics Education in the Department of Learning, Teaching, and Curriculum at the University of Missouri. She examines the ways in which different contexts provide bi(multi)lingual and English Learner students meaningful opportunities to use their full cultural, linguistic, and intellectual resources. She is currently developing a project to collaborate and support bilingual teachers interested in ways to leverage students' resources in the classroom, particularly the translanguaging practices that could enhance learning opportunities for bi(multi)lingual students. In more current work, she explores the extent to which language ideologies affect the privileging of English in bilingual classrooms and how this could limit learning opportunities and create harmful schooling contexts for non-dominant bilingual students in particular.

Jamille Palacios Rivera

University of Missouri – Columbia

Jamille Palacios is an assistant teaching professor in the Agricultural and Applied Economics Department (AAE) at the University of Missouri, Columbia and Cambio de Colores Center fellow. Teaching projects she is undertaking include: development of a hybrid course in data analysis with Excel; development of an agribusiness management teaching game; 3rd edition of custom text book in applied microeconomics; and 1st edition of a marketing plan workbook. She is also an academic advisor, coach and advisor of MU NAMA, and active in several committees in the department, CAFNR and MU-Columbia. Her research interests are on investments in corporate social responsibility in agribusiness as a private PR policy to improve sustainability and wellbeing of farmworkers. Dr. Piedra's earlier work applies social work practice theory to the needs of communities that have experienced a rapid growth in their immigrant Latino population. Her recent work builds on this conceptual foundation by adapting a cognitive behavioral treatment (CBT) to meet the linguistic and cultural needs of depressed immigrant mothers living in communities with new Hispanic populations. Subsequently, she developed Vida Alegre [Happy/Contented Life], a 10-week group CBT to address maternal depression and that trains bilingual BSW and graduate students to implement the model.

Born in Mexico, his father was one of the World War II railroad Braceros —Mexicans who were sent under arrangements between the U.S. and Mexico to keep the railroads running in the U.S. during the war. They were subject to racism, unsafe working conditions and poor living arrangements.

After Sal Valadez arrived from Mexico with his family, this inclusion champion grew up in Aurora, IL. He dropped out of high school, served in the U.S. Army and subsequently earned his GED, high school diploma, Bachelors and Masters degrees from the University of Hawaii at Manoa. He acquired extensive experience in the non-profit and higher education sectors prior to joining the Laborers International Union of North America. He is currently the greater St. Louis Diversity, Outreach and Marketing Representative for the Laborers International Union of North America Midwest Region. "Among his achievements, he single handedly designed and organized events from Central and Southern Illinois to Franklin County to connect immigrants and other at risk populations with resources," Daniel said. "This includes employment opportunities in construction as well efforts to address health, education, shelter and basic human needs. One project has been a health fair at St. Cecilia's Catholic Church which completed its third annual event last year. The fair offers free health screens, immigration and education resources and live music. The region's labor unions are invited participants to help focus on establishing relationships based on mutual trust and respect."

Valadez built working relationships with community resources such as; St. Louis Mosaic Project, Immigrant Service Provider Network, Human Trafficking Collaborative Network, Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, Cambio De Colores, and Gateway Welcome Project.
