
Theory of Class domination

 - ▶ Field
 - ▶ Doxa



Capital

- ▶ Product of Birth
- ▶ Product of Schooling
- ▶ What makes the games of society more than a game of chance
- ▶ The cards you have to play the game
- ▶ Economic, Cultural, or Social



Habitus

- ▶ The conditioning one has to determine how she operates in the game



Field

- ▶ The “rules” of the game
- ▶ The capital or “cards” one has to play, are only valuable in certain games



Doxa

- ▶ The realm of the unquestioned and undiscussed
- ▶ Guides the rules of the game





